pering with European wellness traditions

Framed by British Columbia's transcendent Monashee Mountains and shimmering, 84 mile-long Lake Okanagan, the location is nothing short of breathtaking.

"The goal always was to be completely surrounded by nature, along with having easy access to an airport," describes President and general manager, Hans-Peter Mayr, the veteran Austrian spa developer who, yearning to bring European wellness traditions and innovations to North America, found a like-minded visionary in Swarovski crystal empire patriarch, Gernot Langes-Swarovski, to build Sparkling Hill.

"We knew this was it the moment we came here!"

A more brilliant partnership could not have been forecast. Together, they shaped the untamed mountain's 172 acres into a stellar, \$122-million, 152-room luxury European wellness resort that opened in May 2010 to rave reviews. And, with floor to ceiling windows throughout, there isn't a single room that doesn't have a magnificent view of this glorious landscape.

"The outcome exceeded even our expectations," beams Mayr, describing the construction process and how each section of the 240,000-square-foot resort evolved. "As each of the three levels were built our visual vantage point of the lake and mountains was continually being raised, each time framing such spectacular views that made it hard for us to decide which were the most beautiful. And, as it turns out, they all are!"

INTUITIVE DESIGN An entire chapter could easily be written about the resort's architecture, designed by Cannon Design, Victoria, B.C., and nature-inspired interiors, created by SSDG Interiors, Vancouver, B.C. Its textures, colors, flavors and aromas are a true homage to the senses. In

fact, in assembling its core elements the design team was enlisted on a veritable scavenger hunt to gather and study the property's surrounding natural features - mosses, stones, soil, grasses, leaves, branches, bark, etc. - from which the interior design template was translated and born, explains Mayr.

The minimalist atrium lobby with its soaring 360-degree views of the mountains and lake is a study in showcasing the purity of natural space. At its core are three, massive and utterly spectacular fiber-optic-wired crystal chandeliers that make it irresistible to gaze skyward, both in awe and curiosity. The ideal place for viewing is the low slung, buttery-soft, cowhide seating area that is so inviting it should come with a warning - and a time limit. Paired with delicious, rough-hewn mahogany tables all set against floor-to-celling windows with stellar views of the mountain-rimmed lake, Sparkling Hill brings new meaning to smart casual.

More than three million fiber optic-illuminated crystals (at a cost of \$10 million) are strategically placed throughout the resort to capture and showcase an ever-changing light show. And the touches range in size - from the crystallized signage on the washrooms to those found on the backs of dining chairs, to the four-story-tall, 600-pound crystal in the on-site boutique.

The same detail was paid to each of the stylish 149 guests rooms and three, 1,200-square-foot penthouses regarding design flow, layout and amenities. Which is why the sumptuous customdesigned Kohler soaker tubs (for two) take center stage in front of the floor-to-ceiling windows with unabated views of the mountains or lake rather than being shielded behind doors and walls. A duel



panel system of privacy and blackout shades allow guests to moderate light and privacy, although you will be hard pressed to find a reason to miss a moment of your prized view.

Atrium

Rooms are spacious and sumptuous with powdery soft white linens and duvets, crisp natural wood finishes and earth tones, custom-made king size memory foam beds, and a flat screen television that handsomely divides the sleeping area and bath.

The near-absence of traditional art work and signage throughout the resort is apparent, and not missed a bit. A chance to cleanse one's visual palette and allow the panoramic views top billing, perhaps? I learn from Mayr that the minimal use of signage is no accident. "We want your guests to interact with our staff, to feel invited to ask questions," an especially important antidote to our over-fed minds and hi tech lifestyles.

SPA NIRVANA Dedicated to the whole body wellness, the palatial 40,000-square-foot KurSpa features over 100 different treatments and 48 treatment rooms, exercise and relaxation rooms, swimming pools and seven aromatherapy steam and sauna rooms offering an array of temperatures. In addition to every kind of massage imaginable, the most unique treatment is the -166F degree cold therapy sauna — a treatment that has been known to Europeans like Mayr for decades. By exposing the body to a lower tem-

perature for a series of three-minute sessions, blood flow increases and blood vessels shrink, which reduces inflammation and brings safe and long-lasting relief to expansive array of aliments, including arthritis and joint pain, explains Mayr.

Just ask Inge Kotschner, 72, a German-born area resident who has painful rheumatoid arthritis in her hands and knees with her first cryotherapy treatment. "It's an amazing experience to have such instant relief," says Kotschner. Accompanied by spa personnel, guests dress in light clothing or a swimsuit and foot wear with extra protection for body parts that chill quickly, including ears and hands, and a light surgical face mask to protect the nose and lips. Guests enter through two small pre-chambers (which reduce air exchange between the cold sauna and the two outer rooms) before moving into the main chamber to remain for up to three minutes. Safe and effective, the blood vessels protect vital organs while the body's core temperature is maintained. "And the relief lasts for nine months before I need to go back for another series. It's amazing!"

For those who prefer a little sweating with their pampering, guests can soak up the moist, fragranced heat inside the panoramic sauna. Or, slip inside the granite tiled salt steam. The natural salt cave microclimate works as an anti-allergic and anti-fungal remedy while slowing skin aging and smoothing wrinkles. Follow with an invigorating cool down in the 40-degree, chilled white marble peppermint and eucalyptus-scented igloo, complete with the sound of crackling ice from an unseen audio feed.

The resort features several swimming and lounging pools: The
